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

SINGLE LARGEST CARGO OF FISH PRODUCTS AIRLIFTED

The Fisheries Sector in the state has realized the single largest cargo airlifted from St. Vincent and the Grenadines. This was realized when the Bequia Seafood Company exported 36,000 via the Argyle International Airport.

This achievement was met within the context of key strategies outlined in the National Economic and Social Development Plan (NESDP) 2013 -2025 and the Draft Agri-Export Strategy Initiative for the agricultural and fisheries sector.

Three of these strategic interventions in the NESDP are to stimulate private sector investment in the agricultural sector and encourage public-private partnerships, increase market access for diversified agricultural produce and commercialize the agricultural and fisheries sectors. Among several actions, the Draft Agri-Export Strategy Action Plan called for the leased of government-owned properties for the purpose of operating export facilities under PPP arrangements. Hence, in phase 1 of this plan, Government earlier this year leased several of the Fisheries Centres. These included the Bequia, Owia, Calliaqua, Barrouallie and Canouan Fisheries Centres.

Witnessing the shipment was Minister with responsibility for Fisheries, Hon. Saboto Caesar. In his remarks he noted that it was the quest of the Government to harness the resources within the blue economy and that over the last couple of years, the Government has been working with the private sector to lease and operate the fisheries centres. The Minister indicated that the refrigerated trucks donated

by the Government of Japan are used for the transportation of the 31,000lbs of yellow fin tuna and 5000 lbs of conch from Bequia to the Argyle International Airport.


Minister Caesar encouraged fishers to take advantage of opportunities that are presenting themselves by investing in larger boats, for example, longliners and modern fishing technology to access international markets. The Owia Fisheries Centre marketing under the name Vincy Pride and the Bequia Seafood Company have joint venture marketing arrangements with international companies and corporations and have thus far exported for the first 9 months of 2018 309,060 lbs valued at EC\$3,600,006. Exports consists mainly of conch, yellow fin tuna and spiny lobster primarily to the USA, Dominica and Barbados. The move to lease these centres to the private sector has impacted significantly on the output of the fisheries centres on a whole when the 2018 figures up to September are compared with total output of 502,711lbs valued at EC\$3,992,260 from all centres in 2017 as indicated in the table and graph.

Both companies employ in excess of one hundred (100) persons in the processing and packaging of the products.

The output from the lease arrangement is expected to increase the fisheries sector's contribution to Gross Domestic Product in the short to medium term.





CREATING AND ENABLING ENVIRONMENT FOR AGRI-INSURANCE IN ST. VINCENT AND THE GRENADINES

The Ministry of Agriculture, Rural Transformation, Forestry, Fisheries, Industry and Labour in collaboration with the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) hosted a mission team under a Technical Cooperation Project looking at creating an enabling environment for Agri-Insurance

provision in three Caribbean countries including St. Vincent and the Grenadines. The mission, which was held from the 17^{th} May -22^{nd} May 2018 focused on the following:

- Identification, assessment and facilitation of public-private arrangements that enable the implementation of agricultural insurance mechanisms.
- 2. Strengthening of the technical capacities of public institutions to support the design and implementation of appropriate and accessible risk transfer products.
- 3. Strengthening of farmer understanding of agricultural insurance products, to ensure sufficient demand and uptake.

A farmers meeting was hosted by the Ministry to discuss a mechanism to facilitate the provision of agri-insurance in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.











MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE IMPLEMENTS JAPAN-CARIB BEAN CLIMATE CHANGE PARTNERSHIP (JCCCP) PROJECTS

The Ministry is currently implementing project activities related to two projects.

1. Irrigation Capacity Improvement to Improve Climate Resilience among Small Farmers - JCCCP Grant Funding - US\$191,064.57. The project objective is to enhance farmers' capacity to meet economic needs through installation of irrigation capacities on and off farm to improve their climate resilience through the adoption of climate smart strategies.

2. Climate Change Adaptation Project for Livestock Production. JCCCP Grant Funding - US\$55.555.56. This project seeks to establish mechanisms to tackle declining incomes livelihoods of farm families due to increased intensity and frequency of the dry period, inadequate irrigation infrastructure and continued use of fossil fuel fertilizers on small farms. The project aims to mitigate these issues by constructing small water harvesting systems on small livestock holdings to harvest rain water to be stored for later use. Another aim of the project is the procurement of pelletizers to conserve better quality periods of droughts or floods. The provision of resilient breeds of small ruminants that can withstand the variation in temperature and the increase burden of endoparasites. Two bio digesters have been installed on pig farmers' holdings to convert waste into usable energy for heating and electricity.

PIG PRODUCERS EXPOSED TO HAM-MAKING PROCESS

Several Pig Producers from Agricultural Region Three were exposed to the Ham-Making Process at the News Grounds Agricultural Station. The objectives of the training session were to:

- Build capacity in the sector among stakeholders (youth, farmers and Government staff)
- Strengthen producers organisations to add value to their produce.
- Foster group cooperation and camaraderie.

The training session was facilitated by Dr. Colleen Phillips, Veterinary Officer, Animal Health and Production Division (AHPD) and had participation from 9 farmers, 3 members of staff of the Animal Health Production Division and 2 members from the SVG Community College.

The next steps in the process were to evaluate the product which includes the cooked ham after 15 days and the dry cured ham after 9 months.







POULTRY HATCHERY: 14 YEARS ON......

Primary poultry products (meat and eggs) are the major source of protein in the Vincentian diet. Hence poultry imports primarily meat represent a significant trunk of our food import bill. A review of data on chicken and poultry imports indicates that on average 6,354,211 kgs of whole chicken, neck, back and wings on other chicken parts valued at an average of EC\$25,782,156.20 were imported between 2010 and 2014. In terms of processed chicken products, an average 502,466.6 kgs valued at EC\$3,324,875.6 were imported over the same period.

Cognizant of this fact, the Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines in collaboration with the Taiwanese Technical Mission constructed and opened the Dumbarton Poultry Hatchery and Breeder Unit in 2004. The hatchery which is operated by the Animal Health and Production Division of the Ministry of Agriculture is still operational after 14 years. Amid challenges, it has contributed significantly to the provision of day-old broiler and layer chicks to poultry farmers across the state.

Data from the Agricultural Planning Unit indicates that over the period 2013-2017 352,002 day-old chicks comprising of 244,162 broilers and 107,740 layers valued at EC\$857,677.00 were hatched and distributed. These figures only partially reflect the achievement of the hatchery given that it was established in 2004.



Care for young birds at the Hatchery in Dumbarton



The hatchery has impacted significantly on the supply of table eggs. St. Vincent and the Grenadines can be considered self-sufficient in table eggs. Over the period 2011-2017 egg production data indicate annual production of table eggs averaged 13,830,000 with production peaking at 14,700,000 in 2017.

Once all equipment is functioning and the supply of hatching eggs (layer) are on schedule, there is minimal or no imports during the Christmas season, the period of peak demand.





The supply of day-old broiler chicks has also impacted positively on the growth in local production of poultry meat as the graph and table indicate a growth in production and slaughter of broilers locally.





Despite the achievements of the hatchery, the Animal Health and Production has advised that the annual output of the hatchery is 130,000 day old chicks. In the last 3 years, the facility has been performing at less than half its annual output in each year. This has been mainly due to equipment breakdown and inadequate supply of hatching eggs. Given the significant imports of poultry products, the opportunity still exists for local production to meet domestic demand. It suggests once the limiting factors are addressed on a consistent basis, the hatchery can meet and/or exceed its annual output.

LOBSTER CLOSED SEASON




The Fisheries Division, Ministry of Agriculture Forestry, Fisheries and Rural Transformation is reminding the public, that the lobster closed season is from 1st May to 31st August both days included.

Persons are reminded that during the closed season you CANNOT have any lobsters in your possession. You cannot fish, sell, purchase or harm lobsters during the closed season.

Hotels and restaurants are reminded that they have a grace period of the first thirty days of the beginning of the close season of lobster which is from 1st May to May 30th, to get rid of any lobsters that you may have in stock. If persons fail to adhere to the regulations you can be fined up to \$5000.00.

The general public is also strongly advised to desist from the buying or selling of lobsters, conch and fish on the streets for health reasons.

The Fisheries Division seeks the cooperation of all persons and encourages members of the general public to report all incidences to the Division or the Police Stations in your area, of any person or establishment found in contravention of the regulations.

MONTREAL GREENHOUSE FACILITY LAUNCHED

On the evening of Monday June 25th this nation witnessed the launch of the first ever Greenhouse Park Facility at Montreal in the Marriaqua Valley. This project is a component of the overall European Unionfunded Banana Accompanying Measures (BAM) Project.

BAM is an initiative of the European Union to finance the reorientation of farmers in ACP countries towards diversification of their agricultural sectors following the erosion of preferential arrangements in the UK to bananas.



Greenhouse Park Facility at Montreal

Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Agriculture Raymond Ryan gave a background of the Greenhouse Park project explaining that the project comes as a result of a study on crop production conducted in the year 2010 by Israel's Agency for international Development Cooperation and the Centre for International Agricultural Development Cooperation.

Mr. Ryan revealed that the study recommended the construction of a green-house park of 24 hectares at the highest altitude possible. Montreal was one of the sites selected after a review of all

Area Representative for the constituency of Marriaqua, St. Clair "Jimmy" Prince expressed his gratitude for the realization of the project in Montreal and registered his hopes for the future of agriculture here in St. Vincent and the Grenadines. He especially hoped that the facility will serve as a *teaching agency that farmers in the area will learn best practices and implement them on their own farms*.

Minister of Finance and Economic Development, Hon Camillo Gonsalves was confident that diversified agriculture could continue to play a central role in national economic growth. He saw the greenhouse park facility as a tool in this aspiration.

Minister Gonsalves cautioned against abandoning agriculture so that the notion does not *position itself on the* periphery and in the loopholes of the global financial architecture.

Minister of Agriculture Hon Saboto Caesar explained that the greenhouse park facility is a part of the *evolving* diversified production platform which continues to develop in the state of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

Caesar reviewed the history of Montreal as a productive agro-ecological zone and the strategic placement of the greenhouse park facility in such an area.

He foresees increased involvement of youth in greenhouse production especially in the application of science and technology in intensive crop production.

BLACK SIGATOKA MANAGEMENT IN BANANAS GIVEN SIGNIFICANT BOOST

The Banana Industry in St. Vincent and the Grenadines has been given a further boost through the launch of Phase 1 of a Banana Revitalization Programme through Improvement of Black Sigatoka Management Project on Thursday 21st June 2018 at the Orange Hill Agriculture Biotechnology Centre. The project is jointly funded by the Government of St. Vin-

cent and the Grenadines and the Government of China on Taiwan at an estimated cost of EC\$5.2 million dollars.

Ambassador of the Republic of China on Taiwan to St. Vincent and the Grenadines, His Excellency Calvin Ho in delivering the remarks at the launch highlighted the need for the implementation of the project to proceed quickly given the difficulty faced by farmers and the importance of the industry to St. Vincent and the Grenadines. He added that it was important for Taiwan to share its expertise to overcome this challenge in the industry. His Excellency indicated that in spite of the long years of friendship between the two countries and support for several projects, to him, this was one of the most meaningful given the importance of the industry.

In his feature address, Minister of Agriculture, Forestry, Fisheries, Rural Transformation, Industry and Labour, Hon. Saboto Caesar thanked the Ambassador for the support of the Government and People of Taiwan for this critical project. He reviewed the context of the banana industry from its inception and noted that the industry and marketplace in the 1950's or in 1992 with preferential market access are not similar to today's market place given the removal of preferences. Minister Caesar reiterated that it was more challenging for a banana farmer in 2018 to compete in the global banana market place of today. He noted that he was reliably informed that the market in the UK was asking for an organic banana

which was something that farmers would have to grapple with. He reiterated that the quest of the project is not to return to production levels of 1992 but to establish a sustainable industry. The Agriculture Minister also noted that given the rise in the incidence of cancer in the population, the Ministry is taking another look at aerial spraying and the use of chemicals. He added that persons were making complaints about aerial spraying and the Banana Services Unit was reviewing options to address the problem.

Phase 1 of the project will cost EC\$662,000 and will focus on control methods to improve Black Sigatoka Management on a pilot area of two hundred acres ranging from Colonarie to Orange Hill. It is anticipated that this project will contribute to the reduction in the incidence of Black Sigatoka on bananas and plantains through public awareness and on farm technical support.





SVG FOOD-BASED DIETARY GUIDELINES TO BE REVISED

The Ministries of Health, Wellness and the Environment and Agriculture, Rural Transformation, Forestry, Fisheries, Industry and Labour in the collaboration with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations on the 16th and 17th May 2018, hosted an Intersectoral Workshop to update the National Food

Based Dietary Guidelines (FBDGs) of St. Vincent and the Grenadines at the Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment Conference Room. The opening ceremony was addressed by the Minister of Health, Wellness and the Environment, Hon. Luke Browne.

The objectives of the workshop are:

- 1. To raise awareness about the importance of FBDGs
- 2. To review the methodology proposed by FAO to update the FBDGs
- 3. To define tasks and responsibilities of the members of the committee
- 4. To present the results of the current FBDG's evaluation

The workshop was facilitated by FAO International Nutrition Consultant, Ms. Veronika Molina, formed part of a process of Evaluation, Updating and Dissemination of the St. Vincent and the

Grenadines National Food Based Dietary Guidelines under a broader FAO Technical Cooperation Project (TCP/STV/3601) entitled, "Support the Implementation of Selected Activities of the National Zero Hunger Challenge Initiative (ZHCI) Action Plan of St. Vincent and the Grenadines". This project to evaluate, update and disseminate the National Food Based Dietary Guidelines is being implemented at a cost of approximately US\$94,000.00 and involves the following four components.

- Evaluate, update and approve the updated St. Vincent and the Grenadines National Food Based Dietary Guidelines (FBDG's)
- b. Develop and Implement Capacity

- Building Programs for Food Based Dietary Guidelines
- c. Implement strategy for promotion of the Food Based Dietary Guidelines
- d. Develop and implement a Monitoring and Evaluation plan for the updated FBDGs.

The project is led by the Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment through its Nutrition Unit with support from the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry, Fisheries, Rural Transformation, Industry and Labour through the National ZHCI Coordinator.

In April, the Nutrition Unit commenced the key informant interviews to aid the evaluation of the National Food Based Dietary Guidelines of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

IT'S ALL IN THE BREADFRUIT

Eat something from each group everyday

- 1) Eat a variety of foods from the Food Groups shown in the Breadfruit Picture.
- Eat more fruits and vegetables everyday.
- 3) Reduce fats and oils by cutting back on fatty, oily and greasy foods.
- 4) Use steaming, boiling and baking, as often as possible instead of frying, stewing and berbequeing.
- 5) Reduce the intake of sugar: Use less sugar, sweet foods and drinks.
- 6) When cooking use less salt and salted seasonings. Eat less salted foods and snacks.

- 8) If you use Alcohol do so sparingly both in drinking and food preparation.
- 9) Get moving! Increase physical activity daily.











ARROWROOT INDUSTRY GIVEN SIGNIFICANT BOOST

Arrowroot remains a viable crop for profits and a sustainable income to farmers and by extension the economy of St. Vincent and the Grenadines. As a result, the Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines through the Ministry of Agriculture and other state-owned enterprises such as WINFRESH have taken positives steps to ensure the viability and sustainability of the Arrowroot Industry. To date the following have been addressed:


Arrowroot Industry Association and WINFRESH through an MOU have agreed to establish a Joint Venture Company to boost the marketing of starch. At the end of the 2017-2018 crop, an estimated 250,000 lbs of starch valued at approximately EC\$5 million dollars would be on hand.

The 2017-2018 production season saw 176 farmers producing 139 acres which has thus far yielded 877,767 lbs of rhizomes. The final yield is estimated at 1,079,000 lbs. As a result on June 7, 2018, farmers received EC\$1.3 million dollars for rhizomes sold in the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 production seasons.

Government has been cognizant of the need to replace the current factory with a new one to address competitiveness of the product and the profitability of the asso-

tiveness of the product and the profitability of the association. The following have been addressed:





- a. With the assistance of the CDB engaged the International Trade Centre (ITC) to prepare a way forward for the industry with respect to new processing technologies, expanding market shares and installation of quality assurance systems.
- b. Based on the ITC Report, a capital project was prepared for a new modern factory.
- c. The Government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines has received financial support from the Indian Government to the value of US\$1.2 million to assist with the building of the new factory.
- d. As a stop gap measure an action plan has been developed to remedy deficiencies at the current factory and ensure production until the new factory has been commissioned.
